Green, Lewis Hit Drastic Labor Laws

MIAMI (Fla.) Jan. 29. (AP)—The A.F.L. Executive Council asserted today that "an era of good feeling" existed in labor-management relations but it could be disrupted by drastic legislation being considered by Congress.

A.F.L. President William Green told a news conference that there was every indication "we're now moving into normal production and that is the remedy to inflation."

Green said the relationship between employers and employees was better than it has been for "a long, long time" and industrial peace lays ahead unless Congress upsets things.

Green said that John L. Lewis, head of the United Mine Workers, has concurred in the council's statement.

The statement of the council, with which Green and Lewis have agreed, said strikes were "definitely on the wane."

"It would be a tragic mistake, therefore, for Congress to use the abnormal occurrences of 1946 as the basis for reorganizing by ill-considered and punitive legislation the whole system of free and effective collective bargaining which has been built up step by step over more than half a century and which represents the only democratic process of assuring a square deal to workers, employers and the public as a whole," the council said.
